School meals for a better education

In Haiti, economic reasons are among those most often mentioned by parents to justify the non-registration of their child in school.



"and if you spend yourselves in behalf of the hungry and satisfy the needs of the oppressed, then your light will rise in the darkness, and your night will become like the noonday." Isaiah 58:10 (NIV)

At Pasbwadòm's Divine Help School, providing a warm and balanced meal every school day to each child helps alleviate both the problem related to poverty and the learning difficulties of malnourished children

Our feeding program is therefore very important and is a great help for parents who for the most part do not earn the minimum to meet their family's primary needs.

Well-nourished children learn better, stay longer in school, and are more apt to become productive adults.

Attending classes at Divine Help School means that a child receives at least 40% of his daily food needs. Praise the Lord for the generosity of the school's sponsors!

Comfortably seated in the cafeteria, the students take advantage of this precious moment to develop fellowship, courtesy and the spirit of thanksgiving as they are happy and grateful for a warm nutritious meal.

Our students get healthier as they put into practice hygiene-related lessons such as hand-washing before lunch; they also benefit from de-worming campaigns once a year.

School meals encourage parents to send their children to school to complete their primary education. Parents are confident that their children will receive a healthy school lunch.

Play time at Pastwalet



The children at Pastwalet in Southern Haiti had a good reason to rejoice this past Christmas. They were granted the gift of a well in their village, a well that changes the outcome of Christmas break for them.

Water being essential for the family to survive, the village children are assigned the task of bringing home the vital liquid. Water collecting is part of household chores in rural areas; children are contributing to the essential needs of their families. Their closest well was a long walk from their village, on rocky trails, up and down ravines and two to three trips were necessary, their young bodies wobbling under the heavy water containers.

The hours spent collecting water are long and children are deprived of their freedom, childhood, education, fun and playtime, and natural social and physical development. Long hours of collecting water leads often to late entry into the school system, tardiness, exposure to punishment, and difficulty in undertaking homework.

The donated well did more than just provide them the clean drinking water their bodies rely on to grow strong; that well gave them their childhood back, more time to play and be kids. They were thrilled when the well was installed. Finally, the tiresome journeys a long distance away have come to an end and effort can be put in learning that will open doors for their community in the future.

Because you cared and provided them with a new well they have a better chance at succeeding in life, enjoying soccer and hide and seek, and just being kids.

You can impact a rural child's life by giving them back their childhood, hope and brighter future by sponsoring a well in their village.
