Bulldozer for Wells!

As a fifteen-year-old young man, James Miller utilized his gifts and talents to construct this wooden truck, trailer and bulldozer, and donated it to a Haiti Benefit Auction. At 4 ft. in length, the model is constructed from oak, walnut, and cherry wood. The workmanship is precise and beautifully detailed. Could he have imagined that 21 years later he would see it again and be made aware that it will continue to bless the work of Water for Life in a mighty way?

A young family who has traveled to Haiti numerous times purchased this toy in 1996



at a Haiti Benefit Auction. They have seen firsthand the significance of clean water in Haiti. Most important is better health for the people, but water also provides increased and healthier livestock, vegetable gardens, and even better housing.

Recently God has placed a vision and urging on their hearts to donate this toy to Water for Life to again generate funds to drill more wells in Haiti. With the generous support of several individuals, they have raised \$30,000 to be used as matching funds.

Her gaze reflecting the untold sufferings she's endured since childhood, Alouse hides inside the wreckage of her house destroyed by Hurricane Matthew. This mother and grandmother has come from a very difficult background. At a young age Alouse craved education. Unfortunately it was beyond what her parents could afford, so she has gone through life without knowing how to read or write, trying to earn a living as best she could. With courage and dignity, she suffered outrageous aggressions, first by her male employer, and then by the father of her 10 children, who later abandoned her

She raised all of her children by selling goods in the market place and working as the local matron, managing to purchase a little piece of land and building herself a house. Unfortunately, because of a burning candle she lost her house in a fire. Slowly but surely she started over to rebuild another home out of rocks, mud and dried wood. The finished product was far from a palace, but she and her children felt at home again until the disastrous day of October 4th 2016, when Hurricane Matthew threw them into the street for the second time. From that day, Alouse and her kids had to live in a makeshift house made of thin coconut leaves and clay, facing heavy rainfalls and burning sun but always refusing to give in to despair. In the dark corridor of her sad life strewn with injustice, violence, misery, Alouse always knew that one day her many prayers would find a response.

Today, thanks to all of you who helped replace her house, Alouse can stand, surrounded by her children and grandchildren, as a true model of endurance and ultimately rejoice by faith in the Divine help of the living God.
