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Light in the Darkness

Early in the month of July Haiti observed a sad day of commemoration: the assassination of its President. Since that day last year, the country, which was already going through many hardships, has continued to descend into chaos. Gangs are the law in the capital and poverty is increasing in the whole country.

When we are faced with misery everywhere we look, we can sink into discouragement.

But the Bible tells us in 2 Corinthians 3-4: "3Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, ⁴who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive from God."

In the area of Bois Mauro, about an hour from the city of Les Cayes, a community has had to travel miles and climb a rocky hill to access water. The arrival of the Water For Life drilling truck was a real miracle. Someone had thought of them, someone had had compassion on them and had given them access to the precious liquid. When the pump was installed and functional, what a party there was! Everyone had gathered and couldn't believe their eyes; the water was right there in their village!



Twice we were able to testify to this community that for us it was the demonstration of the love of Christ that enabled this to happen.

So we continue our mission with you to witness to the love of Christ by allowing access to water to those who were in despair. Thank you for your unfailing mobilization which allows, through your donations and your prayers, to restore hope to those who thought they were forgotten.

Mobile Clinic: Here We Go Again!

After almost a year of waiting, we are happy to announce that we have been able to start our mobile clinic activity again.

It took a lot of organizational effort and we had to train a new team of local volunteer health professionals.

Indeed, the majority of doctors and nurses who used to join us came from Port au Prince. The crossing by road from the capital

is now difficult and very dangerous, with many kidnappings taking place there and sometimes people even lose their lives.



We therefore had to find people who understood the vocation of what we do and who agreed to volunteer to serve the population in need.

Even if the team is not yet complete, we were able to set up our first outing in a long time.



Unsurprisingly, the needs were immense for these people who do not have the means to finance health care; some of whom had never before consulted specialists in their life, such as a dentist for example.

On Thursday afternoon, after the installation of the equipment, we held an activity with the community, with a part dedicated to songs of praise and another where we gave advice on water management for sanitation and health purposes. We distributed booklets which presented the Gospel and some Bibles in Creole (highly requested; we will need more for next time!).

Praise the Lord, we have been able to reach out to a lot of people. As you can see in our June stats, ten wells were successfully drilled, and a mobile clinic happened that was closer to our base, using local medical volunteers. It is wonderful when we can demonstrate God's love through our words and actions. THANK YOU for your prayers for the people of Haiti during this very hard time, and especially for our team there. I recognize there are plenty other places in this world that also need our prayers, and I'm not asking you to pray for us at the expense of the others.

One thing to be in prayer about in particular for us is a load of well casing we just received in Haiti. The broker needs to follow protocol to get it through Customs, having many people sign papers one by one, and then comes the biggest headache—getting it safely out to our place near Cayes. It's truly a challenge! Many truckers don't want to take the risk of driving through the gang-controlled area; our costs for shipping the containers out to Cayes from Port au Prince have more than tripled from two years ago.

Life in Haiti is not easy! It takes so much longer to get almost everything accomplished that what it takes in North America... for example, if you drive down a terrible road, of which most are, and get stuck, there's no AAA to call to your rescue! You dig or pay others to dig until you manage to get out. But through it all, God is good, and that never changes! We often hear people there say, God will make a way where there is no way.

So thank you so much for your prayers and your understanding and generous hearts. We love and appreciate you all!
