Faith in Action

Dear Friends, on April 25th and 26th, we had the incredible opportunity to serve the community of Olivier around Ti Goâve. The arrival of our mobile clinic brought joy and hope to many brothers and sisters in need. Requests poured



in for cervical cancer screenings, eye care, general check-ups, sonography, children's health, and dental services. It was a blessing to provide essential medical care to those who might otherwise go without, reminding us of the power of compassion and service.

During our time there, we met Denise Blaise, a 32-year-old expectant mother from the small village of Olivier. Despite working hard alongside her husband—a local baker—she struggled to afford basic necessities like healthcare for her family.



At 39 weeks pregnant, she had never undergone an ultrasound or prenatal check-up, due to financial limitations. Thanks to the clinic, she received a critical sonography that revealed her baby was in a horizontal position. At this stage of the pregnancy, this type of presentation makes delivery at home impossible. The most common solution is a C-section. With



this knowledge, she was referred to a hospital for follow-up. Denise expressed her gratitude, saying, "I worried a lot for the baby. Now I know I must give birth in a hospital to save my child. Above all, I am happy because God has blessed our family with a girl!"

Moments like these remind us that even the smallest act of kindness can change lives. Your continued support, whether through prayer, encouragement, or service, helps provide hope and healing to those in need. As Galatians 6:9 encourages us, "Let us not grow weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up."

May we remain steadfast in faith, uplifting one another and trusting that God works through our hearts and hands to bring comfort and transformation where it's needed most. Blessings!

Official exams for our 9th graders were scheduled to take place June 30 to July 3, please keep our seniors in your prayers as they take their exams July 14-17. In this issue you have been able to read about the blessing of our latest mobile clinic to an area, and the Learning Center has been continuing to be such a blessing to the local community. Please keep praying that we can keep supplies on hand for our drilling and pump repair teams to do their work, and for the vehicles to keep from breaking down! When a vehicle breaks down, it is often weeks till we get the needed parts to get it up and running again! Here in the US you can overnight parts and be ready to go in a day or two, but in Haiti it is a different story.

God is in charge, and we want to spend our time listening to Him and following His leading.

May God bless you all. Keep your eyes on Jesus!
