Easter Mobile Clinic Update – Haiti

During the Easter season, we are grateful for the chance to share God’s love through our mobile clinics. Thanks to your support, our team served families in 2ème Plaine, Ti Goave on March 20–21 and April 2, and the children of the community of Charrier.

What Happened in 2ème Plaine, Ti Goave



The community leaders invited us back because people had been asking for another clinic since last year. Their welcome was warm, and the need was clear. Many came with gratitude, hoping for care they cannot easily access.



Services Provided: Pediatrics, Cervical cancer screening, primary, eye and dental care.

Women who tested positive for early cervical changes received preventive treatment right away, helping protect their future health.

Life Learning Center (LLC), Charrier

On April 2, we held a special clinic for Children in Charrier where our office is located in Les Cayes. They received pediatric, dental, and eye care.

We also helped a few parents in urgent need. One young mother, who suffers from asthma, had not been able to buy an inhaler for months. She had an asthma crisis during the clinic, but our team was able to monitor her condition and provide the medication she needed. Moments like this remind us why your support matters so much.

As we look back on this past Easter season, we thank God for the chance to serve with compassion and hope. And we thank you, our partners, for making this work possible.

Two Blessings That Renew Our Mission of Hope

For many years, our team has carried the deep conviction that serving our brothers and sisters requires both human dedication and the right tools. Drilling new wells and maintaining existing ones is essential to bringing clean water—and renewed hope—to communities in need. Yet without reliable equipment, even the most generous efforts can be slowed. A broken well cannot serve a thirsty family, and a truck in constant repair cannot reach the villages waiting for water. These challenges have tested us, but they have never shaken our commitment.

This season, we are humbled to share two extraordinary blessings. After many months of delay, our long-awaited container has finally been released from customs. It left the United States in September 2025, and today it stands with us—filled with the casings, pumps, and essential materials needed to continue



drilling and restoring wells. Even more, we have received two new repair trucks, accompanied by skilled technicians who ensured they were fully operational. After years of struggling with aging vehicles on difficult roads, this renewal feels like a miracle.

These gifts will allow us to reach more communities, repair wells that have been silent for too long, and continue offering the most precious resource of all: hope.

To celebrate Easter, we had the joy of organizing two wonderful celebrations with the children from Divine Help School and the Life Learning Center. These moments were filled with emotion, learning, and fellowship.

When did your story with Water For Life begin?

My journey with Water for Life began in 2020 when I met the Executive director in Haiti. After I shared my work as a photographer, videographer, and graphic designer, he encouraged me to submit my CV. I completed a three-day trial and soon joined the team, documenting drilling operations, pump repairs, mobile clinics, the Life Learning Center, and the ESD school in Paswadòm.

When my father became ill, I spent two years in the Dominican Republic, and when I returned, the Water for Life team welcomed me back warmly. Today, I work with the marketing team, capturing photos and videos of our activities and creating content for Facebook, Instagram, and the website.

How do you understand and appreciate the mission of Water For Life?

What I understand about Water for Life's mission is that we exist to show the love of Jesus Christ through the services we provide in Haiti. With God's grace and the support of our sponsors, we bring clean water to communities by drilling wells in places where people had no access before.

We also show Christ's love through our mobile clinics, our support for children and schools, and by sharing the message of Jesus wherever we serve. What inspires me most is that we not only help meet physical needs but also teach the command-



ments Christ left us: to love God with all our heart and to love our neighbor as ourselves.

How do you understand your participation in this mission?

My role in the mission of Water for Life is to use photos and videos to show the satisfaction and joy of the people we serve—whether we are drilling wells in communities, providing care through

mobile clinics, or supporting and transforming the lives of children in schools. Through these images, I aim to capture the real impact of our work and the hope it brings to families across Haiti. The images I capture also help tell the story of what God is doing through Water for Life, and as people see this impact, their hearts are often moved to walk alongside us and strengthen the mission.

What impact has this mission had on your life?

The impact this mission has on my life is that it gives me a meaningful way to help people in my country who are in need, and it is truly a joy for me to do so. It has also taught me to be grateful for the water and convenience I enjoy every day, knowing that many others must walk several kilometers just to find water. I thank God, and I thank Water for Life, for giving me this opportunity to serve and to grow through this mission.

From the Director's Desk

There are moments in ministry that stay with you forever. My recent trip to Haiti was one of those moments.

It's easy, from a distance, to think of clean water as a project or a goal. But in Haiti, it becomes deeply personal. You see women and children carrying water jugs along roads and narrow paths.
